

Immeasurably More Wk 2

Main Text: Acts 1:12–26

1. On Sunday, we continued our journey through the book of Acts and looked at “The Return to the Upper Room” (Acts 1:12–26).

What do you remember most from the message?

2. The big idea from Sunday was:

“In moments of uncertainty, God calls His people to pray, prepare, and unite—because what looks like a waiting room to us is a workroom to Him.”

In your own words, what does that mean?

Can you think of a time in your life when what felt like a “waiting room” turned out to be a “workroom” where God was actually preparing you for something?

3. Read Acts 1:12–14 together.

What details about the Upper Room or the people gathered there stand out to you the most?

How do you picture this scene?

4. Read Acts 1:12–14 & Romans 15:5–6 together.

In what ways do you see the idea of being “of one mind” or “in one accord” in these passages?

What are some things that build unity in a church or small group, and what are some things that threaten it?

5. Read Acts 1:12–14 & John 17:20–23 together.

Why do you think Jesus made unity such a big focus in His prayer for future believers?

How does our unity (or lack of it) affect the way people far from God see Jesus and His church?

6. Read Acts 1:12–14 & Matthew 18:19–20 together.

What does it really look like to “agree” in prayer—not just being in the same room, but united in faith and heart?

What are some reasons people might hold back from sharing their real needs with others in prayer?

7. Read Acts 1:15–20 & Matthew 26:14–16 together.

What do these passages teach us about Judas, failure, and betrayal?

How have failures or disappointments with Christians or spiritual leaders affected your own faith journey?

8. Read Acts 1:15–20, Matthew 26:47–50, and Matthew 27:3–5 together.

What differences do you see between regret and repentance in Judas' story?

Are there any areas where you've been stuck in regret instead of taking a step toward repentance and restoration?

9. Read Acts 1:21–26, Psalm 69:25, and Psalm 109:8 together.

What do these passages show us about how the early church used Scripture to make decisions?

How can God's Word guide us when we're not sure what to do next?

10. The disciples were in a season of waiting, but their waiting was active—they prayed, prepared, and got ready for what God would do next. When is a time in your life when you felt like God placed you in a season of waiting on Him?

What did you learn in that season?

11. Today, where do you feel like you're waiting on the Lord—in your life, your family, your work, or your faith?

What are some practical ways our small group can support one another as we wait (encouragement, prayer, accountability, care, etc.)?

12. Spend some time lifting one another up in prayer.

Pray specifically for:

- Unity in our group and church
- Courage to be honest about needs
- Healing where there has been hurt or disappointment

- Faith to actively wait and prepare for what God has next
